CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes

Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan.

This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

Program Year 2024 marked the fifth and final year of the City of Lebanon's 2020–2024 Consolidated Plan. During this period, the City used CDBG funds to address high-priority community needs, including housing rehabilitation, public facilities and infrastructure improvements, code enforcement, and public services.

The City received \$683,277 in CDBG entitlement funds and \$73,814 in program income, for a total of \$757,091 in available resources. Of this amount, \$600,916 was expended during the program year. Investments were directed exclusively to low- and moderate-income residents and neighborhoods, with 100% of funds benefitting low- and moderate-income persons or areas.

Key accomplishments include:

Housing Rehabilitation: One (1) emergency housing rehabilitation project was completed, directly benefitting a low-income homeowner. This continued the City's effort to preserve its aging housing stock and address unsafe conditions.

Public Facilities and Infrastructure: CDBG funding was used to complete critical street improvements to multiple streets in low-moderate income neighborhoods. Those streets include 8th Street from Willow to Walnut Street, Lincoln Ave from Cumberland Street to Maple Street, Willow Street from 7th to 9th Street and Liberty Street from Spring Street to the entrance of Veterans Memorial Walkway. The improvements included a 2.5-inch milling of the existing roadway, followed by a 2-inch scratch course overlay to restore the surface and improve drivability. In addition to resurfacing, the project incorporated line painting and the installation of new crosswalks, ensuring improved visibility and pedestrian safety. These enhancements provide a smoother and safer transportation route for residents, businesses, and visitors who rely on this critical roadway.

Public Services: The City continued its long-standing investment in public safety, supporting crime prevention and police patrols in the Northwest quadrant and the Central Business District.

Code Enforcement: In 2024, the City of Lebanon utilized CCDBG funding to support three part-time Code Enforcement Officers dedicated to addressing property maintenance issues in low- and moderate-income census tracts. These efforts aimed to eliminate blight, ensure compliance with local codes, and preserve a healthy living environment for residents. Over the course of the year, the Code Enforcement Officers serving in low-moderate-income census tracts opened a combined total of 956 new cases. There was a total of 798 cases successfully closed, while 98 remain open. For the remaining cases, the officers are actively working with property owners to remediate violations and bring properties into compliance.

Administration: The program was fully administered in compliance with HUD regulations, including

monitoring, reporting, and citizen participation requirements.

Overall, the City aligned its 2024 program activities with the Consolidated Plan goals and continued to address priority housing and community development needs.

Narrative

During Program Year 2024, the City of Lebanon's CDBG-funded activities primarily benefitted residents in low- and moderate-income neighborhoods on an area-wide basis. Much of the investment was in public facilities, street improvements, and code enforcement, which improve conditions for all residents in target areas rather than direct services to individually enrolled households. Since we do not have specific racial and ethinical demographic information broken down into individual census block groups, the only activity we are able to report racial and ethinic population data on is through the Emergency Rehab Program. In 2024, one (1) low-income homeowner received assistance through the City's Emergency Rehab Program. The assisted household identified as White, non-Hispanic.

The City of Lebanon targeted the low/moderate census tracts and block groups throughout the City for a majority of the activities. The Census Tracts and Block Groups where at least 51% of the resident households have reported incomes that are 80% or below the area median income. These income limits/qualifications are published by HUD and use the statistical information identified in the 2011-2015 American Community Survey (per Notice CPD-19-02).

Additionally, the City does not target a specific area for the Homeowner Rehabilitation Program but rather the individual household demographics; therefore, this program affects households community wide.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City of Lebanon's CDBG Emergency Rehabilitation Program is designed to assist eligible low- and moderate-income households within the City to alleviate dangerous, hazardous, and/or unsanitary conditions that pose an immediate risk to health or safety. In 2024, the City provided one (1) homeowner with emergency rehabilitation assistance, which involved replacement of a leaking oil tank to restore safe heating.

The City had initially established a one-year goal of assisting three (3) non-homeless households through affordable housing activities. However, there are several reasons for the difference between the stated goals and actual outcomes:

First-Time Homebuyer Program: Lebanon County administers a countywide First-Time Homebuyer Program that serves all low- and moderate-income residents, including those within the City of Lebanon. To avoid duplication of benefits, the City chose not to implement a separate CDBG-funded homebuyer program during the 2024 program year. While this explains

why the goal shows “3” under homebuyer assistance, the program was not offered.

Housing Rehabilitation Program: The City set a goal of completing three (3) homeowner rehabilitation projects. One emergency rehabilitation was completed in 2024, and three additional applicants are in the eligibility process with anticipated completions in the upcoming program year.

Program Administration Transition: In 2024, the City made the decision to transition administration of the Emergency Rehabilitation Program from the Lebanon County Redevelopment Authority to City staff. During this transition, the program was evaluated and restructured to better meet community needs. The City adopted a new program design offering up to \$15,000 in emergency rehabilitation assistance in the form of a forgivable loan, forgiven over a five-year period so long as the property owner does not violate any terms of their mortgage. This change is expected to make the program more accessible and effective for eligible households moving forward.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

The outcomes and program adjustments in 2024 will shape how affordable housing activities are approached in future Annual Action Plans:

Pipeline of Projects: With three applicants already in process, the City anticipates higher completion numbers in the 2025 program year. Future goals will better reflect the timing of project approvals and completions.

Program Improvements: By administering the program in-house, the City has more flexibility to streamline processes, strengthen outreach, and monitor performance. The introduction of the forgivable loan structure will likely increase demand and improve compliance, while offering meaningful relief to households facing emergency housing needs.

Strategic Focus: Since the countywide First-Time Homebuyer Program continues to serve City residents, the City will prioritize its CDBG housing resources on emergency rehabilitation to avoid duplication and maximize impact. This ensures that CDBG funds address the most urgent housing needs within Lebanon.

Long-Term Impact: The program refinements and current pipeline of applicants demonstrate that the City is committed to preserving its existing housing stock, stabilizing neighborhoods, and supporting low- and moderate-income homeowners. These lessons and adjustments will strengthen the City’s ability to meet Consolidated Plan goals in upcoming years.

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Lebanon is actively involved with the Lebanon County Coalition to End Homelessness, helping to lead efforts focused on eviction prevention as a strategy to reduce inflow into homelessness. Through the Coalition, the City works directly with service providers and housing advocates to better understand the needs of unsheltered persons and those at risk of losing housing.

Separately, the City also collaborates with the Community Health Council of Lebanon County to host community-wide events that elevate housing issues more broadly. In 2024, the City and the Health Council co-hosted two "Let's Talk Housing" summits. These events were not part of the Coalition's work, but rather served as community forums to present the 2023 Housing Needs Assessment, share best practices from surrounding municipalities, and feature speakers from the PA Housing Alliance and the Commonwealth on eviction prevention strategies and the state's housing action plan. These summits provided outreach and education, improving both public awareness and provider coordination around housing and homelessness challenges.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

In 2023, the City of Lebanon provided CDBG-CV funding to support the renovation of the Chestnut Street Community Center, which was developed to serve as the permanent home of the Fresh Start low-barrier homeless shelter operated by Lebanon County Christian Ministries. Construction began in May 2023 and renovations were completed in January 2024. Donor-restricted funds were also utilized to create a safe, warm, and welcoming space designed specifically for shelter operations.

On February 13, 2024, the Fresh Start Shelter formally opened its doors, transitioning from a rotating church-based model to a dedicated facility. This milestone allowed guests to sleep in beds rather than mats for the first time, providing a more stable, dignified, and supportive environment. The shelter offers 22 beds, full bathrooms, laundry, kitchen facilities, children's play space, and staff offices.

In addition to Fresh Start, other community partners such as the Lebanon Rescue Mission continue to provide emergency and transitional housing services. Together, these facilities ensure that homeless individuals and families in Lebanon have access to safe shelter while they

work toward longer-term housing solutions.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Prevention remains a key focus of the City's housing and homelessness strategy. Through its role in the Lebanon County Housing Collaborative (a partnership between the City, Community Health Council, Lebanon County, the Redevelopment Authority, and local nonprofits), the City is working toward long-term systemic solutions, including the creation of a new Housing Director position. This individual will coordinate efforts to address barriers and unmet needs identified in the 2023 Housing Needs Assessment, such as eviction prevention and access to supportive housing.

The "Let's Talk Housing" summits the City hosted in collaboration with the Community Health Council in February and March of 2024 also featured presentations on eviction prevention strategies, including best practices shared by the PA Housing Alliance. These efforts complement the work of Lebanon County Christian Ministries, which provides rental and utility assistance, as well as other social service agencies addressing health, employment, and education needs. Collectively, these programs reduce the risk of homelessness among extremely low-income households and those at risk of institutional discharge.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City supports its service agency partners who play a vital role in helping homeless persons transition into permanent housing. Lebanon County Christian Ministries, the Lebanon Rescue Mission, and other nonprofits provide case management, job readiness, and wraparound services to shorten the length of homelessness and improve housing stability. The new Fresh Start Shelter exemplifies this effort by pairing safe, temporary housing with supportive services such as employment assistance, counseling, and family stabilization resources.

Through the City's partnership in the Housing Collaborative, efforts are being aligned to expand affordable housing supply and supportive housing options across the county. By addressing barriers identified in the Housing Needs Assessment and coordinating resources through a countywide Housing Director, Lebanon City and its partners aim to reduce repeat episodes of homelessness and increase access to permanent, affordable housing.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The City of Lebanon does not administer any public housing programs. Public housing is overseen by the Lebanon County Housing Authority (LHA), which provides a comprehensive package of housing and social services to tenant and Section 8 recipients.

The Housing Authority continues to offer a broad range of programs:

- Supportive Services for Elderly Residents: A case worker provides ongoing social services to enrich residents' lives and support independent living. When higher levels of care are needed, the Assisted Living Program, operated with the Lebanon County Area Agency on Aging, is available. Social activities are organized through resident committees.
- Resident Representation: LHA has a Resident Commissioner in accordance with QAHRA, and a tenant representative regularly attends Authority Board meetings.
- Resident Initiatives: A Resident Initiative Program and Coordinator, funded through the Capital Fund Program, provide support services and engagement opportunities for tenants.
- Services for Younger Residents: A six-person staff (half bilingual) offer counseling, case management, life skills education, and housing referrals. Areas of emphasis include budget counseling, employment, interpersonal issues, parenting, and maximizing income.
- Employment Development: LHA coordinates an employment development program, which includes bus transportation and day care for newly employed low-income persons throughout the county.
- Special Programs:
 - *Hispanic Outreach Program* provides advocacy for Spanish-speaking residents.
 - *Medical Transportation Assistance Program* helps residents with transportation to medical appointments.
 - *Housing Assistance and Resources Program (HARP)* provides assistance to homeless and near-homeless families and individuals, supported by multiple funding streams.
 - *BRIDGES* (a self-sufficiency program) helps residents of assisted housing, individuals on waiting lists, or persons referred by HARP to set goals and move toward employment and independence.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority maintains a Community Service Policy outlined in its Public Housing Admissions and Occupancy Policy, available at the Administrative Office and online at

www.lebanoncountyhousing.com. While HUD regulations do not require LHA to operate a formal Self-Sufficiency Program, residents are represented on the Housing Board, and the Authority promotes City and County homeownership programs to its tenants.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

Not applicable. The Lebanon County Housing Authority is not designated as a troubled PHA.

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The City of Lebanon does not intentionally create policies, codes, or rules that act as barriers to affordable housing. However, like many communities, the City faces challenges such as rising construction costs, complex financing structures, and the affordability gap between incomes and housing costs. Most local ordinances and regulations are in place to ensure safety or maintain compliance with state and federal requirements.

The City's zoning ordinance, updated in 2020, continues to be reviewed to ensure it does not restrict affordable housing development. The City has not enacted tax, fee, or growth control policies that would limit housing opportunities.

The City is also engaged in forward-looking planning efforts. It serves on the steering committee for the Lebanon County Comprehensive Plan update, ensuring that affordable housing and revitalization priorities are integrated into countywide planning strategies. In addition, the City recently applied for a grant to support the update of its own Comprehensive Plan, last comprehensively updated in 2004, to modernize land use, zoning, and housing strategies in line with current needs.

Another major initiative guiding housing policy is the Lebanon County Housing Needs Assessment, completed in 2023 with ARPA funding. This study analyzed both countywide and city-specific housing data to:

1. Better understand the evolving housing market,
2. Establish housing priorities,
3. Inform modifications to local government housing policies, and
4. Identify strategies to expand affordable housing supply.

Finally, the City continues to utilize CDBG funding to preserve affordable housing stock through its Emergency Rehabilitation Program, which now offers forgivable loans of up to \$15,000 for urgent housing needs. Code Enforcement staff promote the program to households receiving violation notices for structural deficiencies, helping to prevent displacement and preserve livable housing for low- and moderate-income residents.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

As noted in the Consolidated Plan, the system of service delivery for very low-income populations remains fragmented. The City continues to work with existing organizations to identify and respond to needs as they arise. Through participation on the Lebanon County

Coalition to End Homelessness, the City supports strategies to prevent homelessness and expand supportive housing services.

The City also continues to cooperate with local nonprofits, housing advocates, and affordable housing providers to address gaps in services. Fair housing information remains publicly displayed in City Hall, and a Fair Housing Analysis of Impediments guides actions to affirmatively further fair housing.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City's Housing Rehabilitation Program follows the federal lead-based paint requirements at 24 CFR Part 35. Policies and procedures require:

- Notifying homeowners and tenants of the presence of lead hazards.
- Testing or presuming lead hazards for any disturbed painted surfaces.
- Providing EPA-approved lead hazard information pamphlets.
- Reducing hazards as required by regulation.
- Performing clearance and dust testing prior to re-occupancy.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City continues to pursue housing rehabilitation and economic development projects that benefit families living below the poverty level. Downtown revitalization efforts, public infrastructure investments, and support for small businesses all contribute to creating jobs and improving the City's economic climate.

The City's Section 3 Plan remains in effect, providing employment and contracting opportunities for low-income residents and businesses. Contractors are reminded of Section 3 obligations in all covered contracts.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City works closely with both public and private partners. Staff continue to serve on boards and committees across the community, including the Lebanon County Redevelopment Authority, Lebanon County Affordable Housing Council, Lebanon Valley Chamber of Commerce, Lebanon Valley Economic Development Corporation, and Lebanon County Housing Collaborative. These partnerships help ensure coordination in addressing housing and community development needs.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City's Community & Economic Development Office is responsible for enhancing

coordination among providers. The City continued cooperation with local and regional agencies to meet housing and supportive service needs. The City also participates in the Lebanon County Housing Collaborative, which is advancing countywide coordination efforts and aims to hire a Housing Director to lead these initiatives.

The City continues to promote fair housing by participating in the Affordable Housing Council of Lebanon County, supporting outreach through the Hispanic Outreach Center, and monitoring policies and programs for any discriminatory effects, however unintended.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

- **Impediment 1 – Fair Housing Education and Advocacy:** The City maintains its Fair Housing Analysis on its website, posts fair housing materials at City Hall, and includes information in newsletters. A New Resident Guide (English and Spanish) provides education on rights and complaint procedures.
- **Impediment 2 – Accessible Housing:** The City partners with county agencies and refers residents to the **ACCESS Program**, which in 2024 continued to provide home modifications to improve accessibility.
- **Impediment 3 – Public Policies:** The City's zoning ordinance was updated in 2020 and continues to be reviewed and adjusted as needed to support fair housing.
- **Impediment 4 – Affordable Housing:** The City partners with the County Redevelopment Authority, nonprofits, and housing advocates to expand affordable housing. In 2024, CDBG supported one emergency rehab, and additional households were assisted with HOME funds administered countywide.
- **Impediment 5 – Housing Rehabilitation:** The City has taken over direct administration of its Emergency Rehabilitation Program and redesigned it as a forgivable loan program to improve participation. Three additional households are in the eligibility process for 2025.
- **Impediment 6 – Overcrowding:** The City continues to prohibit conversions of homes into smaller units and encourages conversions to larger units suitable for families. In 2024, no conversions to smaller units were recorded.

The City of Lebanon's Community and Economic Development Office is primary responsibility for monitoring the CP. This office keeps records on the progress towards meeting the CP goals and on the statutory and regulatory compliance of each activity.

For each activity authorized under the National Affordable Housing Act, the Department of Community and Economic Development established fiscal and management procedures that will ensure program compliance and funds accountability, and that reports to HUD are complete and accurate. These programs are subject to the Single Audit Act.

Several opportunities are provided each year for citizen participation in planning activities and in reviewing accomplishments, in accordance with the City's adopted Citizen Participation Plan.

For the 2024 CAPER, notice of a 15-day public comment period beginning on September 4, 2025 and a public hearing scheduled for Thursday, September 18, 2025, at 4:45 PM was published in the Lebanon Daily News on August 30, 2025. In addition, informational and hearing-specific posts were placed on the City of Lebanon's Facebook account, and details were posted on the City's website to ensure broad access to information.

The draft of the 2024 CAPER was made available on the City's website, at the City Administration Office, and at the Lebanon Community Library for public review during the comment period.
